Legislative Update

DCYF Senior Policy Advisor Melissa Cheesman provided a legislative update.

Discussion	 For the transition to kindergarten ask - is the money for the steering committee to look into incorporating those requirements or is it being used to fund the groundwork? It is used to fund the groundwork and collaboration for the network to be able to effectively channel families into program choices. So, this is to staff the steering committee, correct? This is for the work of the steering community collaborating and coordinating recruitment and enrollments. The funding is also added for existing contracts with key partners. Again, to enable that coordination. Who is going to be spearheading this work? Will CE be forming and coordinating? There has been a Coordinated Recruitment and Enrollment (CRE) group working on implementing this system. The original group included many providers, around 100 people, but that has been reduced to around 15 due to lack of funding. I think this funding is aimed at trying to make CRE into a reality and put together plans to try and make it functional.

The only update we have is that it is still moving. What kinds of tax exemptions are in SSB 6038? It is the business and occupation (B&O) tax. Can you also share if DCYF signed in pro or con for each of these bills? DCYF did not provide any testimony pro or con but did provide edits to include childcare providers serving children that are defined as eligible, which would include this under 13 category as well as 19 with verified special needs.

Cost of Quality Care Rate Model Recommendations and Study

DCYF's Federal Initiatives and Collaboration Administrator Matt provided an update on Cost of Quality Care Rate Model Recommendations and Study and gathered feedback on outreach for the Study's final weeks.

Discussion	 The following is taken from the King Co./Seattle cost of care report - The true cost of childcare when caregivers receive a living wage and benefits is around \$40,000 a year for an infant, \$30,000 for a toddler, \$25,000 for a preschooler, and \$13,000 for a school-age child. Also acknowledging that there is a mix of private and State paid children in programs that make certain things possible. Are you saying base rates are based on Cost of Living in different regions in WA state? Yes, the basis that the design team looked at was a couple of different options for cost of living. DCYF Temporary Licensing Subcommittee (TLS) Recommendation Response

DCYF's Senior Childcare Administrator Travis Hansen, Director of Early Care and Education Hunter Xtaba and Assistant Secretary of Licensing Ruben Reeves presented DCYF's formal response to the recommendations from the Temporary Licensing Subcommittee of ELAC.

Discussion	 If a provider requests copies because they don't have the capacity to print, will the department (maybe their licensor?) send it to them? We can do that upon request. I think there remains concerns that providers have no way to know when updates are made to the guidebook or direct providers to the changes. Can there be a guidebook updates supplement or similar document?
	 We can look into how to do a better job and to show when updates are made in the guidebook.



	 This might exist already, but is there a good, simple resource that shows how all the state subsidies line up and the overlap with different income levels? We can line up something that shows how ECEAP and Working Connections line up. We also see a lot of counties, cities, and local municipalities putting out subsidy opportunities. Are there other subsidies that you're thinking of? If it's by city or region, I'm imagining a line that shows zero income to however much and little sections that are above it that line up what these different options are. They do come and go, and they sometimes change and so just having a quick resource to see what families can apply for would be helpful for families. We will follow up on this. It would be great to include the Military Child Care Fee Assistance program in that comparison that Jerrod is referring to. The program pays a fee assistance directly to the participating childcare provider based on the military family's household income. We will do that and reach out to you with any questions.
