Community Cafes are another example. Bringing the protective factors to life is a great training and really sticks when it can be
	provided and led by a parent. Parents have signed up to collect stories from families.
	• What kinds of presentations, trainings, or capacity building for parent leadership would you like to see?
	 Pointing parents in the right direction towards community action groups and showing parents that there are other ways they can be involved in their communities that can give them opportunities to grow and be hands on.
	• It is part of advocacy and leadership. Sharing stories are necessary if the goal is to create any type of change. Some people might not feel comfortable sharing, and that's fine too, but without illustrating the problems or gaps in services, how will anyone know what needs to change?
