
Relative Search and Notification

Why conduct a Relative Search?

The requirement for conducting a Relative Search is supported by Public Law 110-351, Fostering Connections to Success.

This law requires that child welfare agencies throughout the United States notify all adult relatives when a child is removed from parental custody.






The connection to family and community is very important to a child because:



Children can live with people they may already know and trust.



Children maintain their personal and cultural identity.



Families identify their own resources and strengths.



Relatives are integral members of the child & family's support team.




Relatives can fill in family history gaps (health, behavioral, ed.) when a parent may be unavailable to do so.

Who's considered a relative in Washington State?

RCW 74.15.020 identifies the people who DCYF consider to be relatives.

Persons related to a child include, but are not limited to...



Parents, siblings (including adoptive and step-family members), aunts, uncles etc.



Grandparents, great aunts and uncles.



Great grandparents and Greatgreat grandparents.

Caseworkers & Caregivers



Relative search and engagement is an ongoing process that continues throughout the life of a case; identifying and notifying relatives can take time.

DCYF staff must be transparent with Caregivers about this process and the ongoing efforts to engage and place with relatives when it is in a child's best interest.

Relative Search is required for all children in Washington State placed in out-of-home care.

Q. When does the Relative Search process start? A. Within 30 Days after a child is placed out of home.

Prior to starting a Relative Search, the RSU will contact the Caseworker to determine the following:

- Has the child been returned home?
- Has an Indian child's tribe taken jurisdiction?
- Is there a No Contact Order between the child and an adult relative?
- Has paternity been established?
 - ✓ If not, only a search for maternal relatives will be conducted.
 - ✓ Caseworkers must inform the RSU within 5 calendar days of learning that paternity was established to ensure a search of paternal relatives is conducted.





Information Regarding Relative Placement/Support

Q1: I don't know if or how I am related to a child who is in need of foster care so what should I do? A1: If you don't know how you might be related to a child, please contact the relative search specialist. They will be able to help you understand how you're related.

Q2: I am interested in being a placement resource for the child. What will I need to do?

A2: To ensure a safe and suitable home for a child placement, the following is required:

- Each person age 18 and older living in the home must pass a national background check.
- A caseworker will complete an initial home visit to ensure the health, safety and well-being of a
- A Home Study will be completed to assess each caregiver's abilities to meet the needs of the
- Q3: A household member has criminal history. Does that mean I would not be approved? A3: Criminal history is reviewed carefully to determine child safety. Some crimes are permanently disqualifying, but others can be considered. This can occur through looking at factors such as: how much time has passed, the age you were at the time of offense, your life as it is today, and other objective factors.
- Q4: If I reside out of state, could I still be chosen for placement? A4: There is a process in place that allows relatives who reside in another state to be considered for placement. This is called the Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children, and can be explained in more detail by the child's assigned social worker.




What is shared by the Relative Search Unit?

Upon receipt of a telephone call or email from a relative, the following information may be provided:

- A brief explanation of Public Law 110-351 requiring notification to all adult relatives when a child is placed in out-of-home care within 30 days of placement.
- A general statement, "The child was found to be in need of protection and was placed in State care, however we cannot speak to the specifics of the case."
- An overview of the dependency process.
- The assigned Caseworker's contact information.
