- "normal"/twice exceptional (developmentally, medically, behaviorally, etc.)
  - We need to look at how to educate people at DCYF instead of just going to individual parents.

  - o This is the full list taken from the August 11 in-person meeting. We did not want to consolidate or take any out without showing the full survey results to the group. This will be done in November.

### 2024 Legislative Session Presentation

### Discussion The submitted Decision Packages can be found on the Government Affairs webpage. What age does extended foster care go up to? The goal is to create successful transitions to adulthood so it must be aimed at the high teens as they age out.

- Extended Foster Care (EFC) is a voluntary program that offers dependent youth the option of remaining in care until age 21 to support a successful transition to independence.
- Regarding the Making Child Care Work for Families Decision Package, how does this compare to last year's package? I'm curious if they reworked the fiscal note on that. It was on the table last year and it didn't pass because it was going to cost so much. Does that mean the money has been lowered?
  - Twelve million dollars sounds like a lot of money to support 1,500 kids.
    - So that's specifically for that one component of the ask. The participation in the Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program (ECEAP) and Head Start as an approved activity for Working Connections.
      - So, the twelve million is for all of those components?
        - Yes, it is for all of the ask including the staffing to support these programs.
  - o Educate parents so they can leverage that funding. That will be important.
- If I understand correctly, DCYF submits the decision package to the governor for his budget - but we can still do advocacy with our local representatives because they need to know

why this is important. Do they have to pass bills also or do they just have to agree with the			
governor's budget?

- The legislators don't have to agree with the governor's budget. As a state agency we are constrained by what the governor decides to put in his budget. This is basically what we're asking him for and then he'll make decisions, yes or no, scale them back, or choose not to do some of our priorities. Then we are mostly limited to doing education around the things he has given us authorization to move forward on. However, we share these packages with you because it's important to see the full range and scope of our asks for the legislative session. The local legislators can introduce amendments and advocate for things that either are or are not in their ideal budgets. All of those negotiations will happen near the end of the legislative session.
  - The session calendar will be posted online once the dates are set.
