Who Are Emerging Adults?

- 18-25 years old
- Still developing (psychologically and neurologically) and share many of the same characteristics of younger peers
 - *Hot* cognition (developed by late 20s) vs. *Cold* cognition (developed earlier/teens)
 - Susceptible to peer influence, impulsive, less future-oriented, and prone to risk-taking
 - More pronounced if history of trauma and brain injuries
 - Uniquely vulnerable (high levels of victimization, mental health disorders, and substance use)
 - Also, uniquely malleable to and capable of positive change

Sociological Research


Indicates that youth must cross developmental "bridges" to mature out of delinquency. These "bridges" have been elongated due to social and economic changes.

- Meaningful employment
- Marriage/trusting relationships

Elements of desistance has shown need for:

- Role models/mentors
- Finding self in a role as a helper/giver
- Having changes (improvements) in behavior recognized

Most emerging adults "age out" of crime by 25





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Emerging Adults: Disproportionate Share in Adult Criminal Legal System & Highest Recidivism Rates


Disproportionality of Justice Involvement Among 18-24-year-olds (CO 2020)

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
9-Year Rearrest Rates 18-to 24-year-olds, U.S.A. (2005 Release Cohort)

Racial and ethnic disparities of emerging adults in the criminal justice system are stark

- Black male 18-to 24-year-olds compromised 42% of all emerging adults admitted to state and federal prisons in the U.S.A. in 2016.
- Racial and ethnic disparities are highest for younger cohorts (ages 18-19). Black males ages18-19 are 11.8 times more likely than their White peers to be incarcerated.

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Justice involvement delays and prevents achievement of key developmental milestones.

A conviction is a barrier to:

- Employment: A felony record cut the employer response rate by half for white male applicants and nearly 2/3 for Black male applicants.
- Housing: Felony convictions restricts access to subsidized housing benefits. Screening for criminal records for rental housing in the private market.
- Education: >90% of college admission officials surveyed consider any felony conviction as particularly negative.
- Interferes with elements of desistance



Emerging Adult Justice (EAJ)

- Creating fair, effective and developmentally appropriate services, programs and opportunities for EAs
- Strengths-based, growth-focused approaches

Positive EA outcomes = PUBLIC SAFETY

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Specialized POLICIES/LAWS

• Expanding the <u>juvenile</u> justice system

RtA is being implemented now in VT Proposals have been made in CA, CO, CT, IL, MA, NE VA and WA

 Expanding or creating <u>hybrid</u> systems (often called "youthful offender laws") – a 3rd justice system

e.g., MI's Holmes Youth Training Act & DC's Youth Rehabilitation Act

• Reforming the <u>adult</u> criminal legal system

e.g., expungement, parole/resentencing

<u>Nebraska</u> Probation/ Community Supervision


