WAC 110-30-0030. These allegations are documented in writing in the intake taken by the Intake unit. They are available to the provider as a part of disclosure at the completion of the investigation.

RCW 43.216.365 states that any "agency" operating without a license is guilty of a misdemeanor. RCW 43.216.010(1) broadly defines "agency" to mean "any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, or facility that provides child care and early learning services outside a child's own home." However, there are several exemptions to this broad requirement. RCW 43.216.010(2) lists 13 types of care that are not required to be licensed by DCYF. Accordingly, programs that fall under these exempt categories can provide child care and early learning services without a DCYF license. State law would need to change to accomplish the workgroup's recommendation that all children, regardless of hours provided, in Washington state be licensed and follow the same rules and regulations of DCYF.
