What is Multi-Licensing?

- Multi-Licensing is the approval of a licensee to hold more than one out of home care license, i.e., family home foster care license and one or more licensed or certified child care licenses.
- All applicants that have held at least one license for at least one year and are 21 years of age plus, can apply for the other license.
- Each license stands on its own. A licensee can choose to close one license and remain licensed for the other.

Why Multi-Licensing (foster care and child care)


- Allowable by RCW, WAC, and DCYF Policy
- Identified as a need by Foster Care reps:
 - ✓ Placements are often declined by foster parents due to lack of child care providers in their area.
 - ✓ Could allow more children to remain in their communities.
 - ✓ Non-safety exemption could increase the ability for kinship caregivers to get licensed, if they already have an in-home child care license.
- Identified as a need by Child Care reps:
 - ✓ Increased access.
 - ✓ Financial support.
 - ✓ Maintaining relationship and keeping children in their community.




Tribal Interest and Data Results

- 34% of those recruited were able to participate
- 36.5% of those able to participate were successfully dually licensed
- 24% of those initially with a Foster Home License were successfully dually licensed
- 35% of those initially with a Child care licensed were successfully dually licensed
- 67% of American Indian/Alaskan Native and 67% Hispanic/Latino who were recruited were successful in becoming dually licensed the highest race/ethnicity.
