What is crime victim compensation (CVC)?

CVC is a program within Labor and Industries (L&I) that provides resources for individuals who may have been injured or traumatized as a result of a violent crime in Washington State. Applications are available in nine languages: Crime Victims Forms & Publications (wa.gov).

Costs Covered by CVC Include¹:

- Expenses not covered by other insurance (co-pays, deductibles, etc.)
- Funeral expenses
- Grief counseling
- Medical and dental treatment
- Medication
- Mental health treatment
- Partial wage loss replacement
- Medical forensic exams for sexual assault cases and/or domestic violence strangulation cases (this service does not require a report to law enforcement)

Who Can Apply?

Individuals who have:

- Experienced **physical injury or mental health** trauma as a result of gross misdemeanor or felony crime in WA State
- Reported crime to law enforcement
- Submitted a timely CVC application

Can Foreign Nationals, Immigrants Apply?

Yes, foreign nationals, immigrants and individuals without documentation status can apply.

- A social security number is not required
- There are no questions about documentation or immigration status
- The crime(s) has to have occurred in Washington State
- Every state has CVC programs

What if the Crime Occurred Over a Long Period of Time?

• A description of the experience (crime) can be provided in the application if there is no firm date of the incident. *CVC does need a police report.*

What if the Crime Occurred Years Ago, but the Victim Recently Disclosed?

• CVC will assess the unique experience(s) of individuals related to reporting the incident.

1 cvc is a secondary payor; assistance may be available if other sources such as insurance or Medicare have been billed or are unable to provide coverage.
