

What We Do

Serves as a voice within government for the needs of crime victims in Washington state. Established in 1990, OCVA serves the state by:

- Advocating on behalf of victims obtaining needed services and resources
- Administering grant funds for community programs working with crime victims.
- •Assisting communities in planning and implementing services for crime victims.
- •Advising local and state government agencies of practices, policies, and priorities that impact crime victims.
- •Creating service standards & accreditation for community-based advocacy programs to ensure high quality of service delivery across the state.



Office of Crime Victims Advocacy (OCVA)

- Works with tribal organizations, governments, community-based organizations and individuals to reduce the impact of crime & violence
- Our programs provide a range of services to include crisis intervention, victim advocacy, therapy, medical forensic exams, legal aid, prevention, education, law enforcement & medical social work for primary & secondary survivors of all ages, gender identities
- Focus on marginalized & Native American communities, By And For organizations
- Some of the crime types:
 - Sexual Assault/abuse (child, teen & adult)
 - Burglary
 - Assault
 - Domestic Violence (household, family, intimate partner)
 - Stalking
 - Human Trafficking (Labor & Sex)
 - Homicide
 - Vulnerable adult abuse

Victim Advocacy

- -Community Sexual Assault Programs (CSAPs)-free, all ages, low barrier, holistic
- -Self-empowerment model & choice, not therapy, rooted in social justice, restorative justice
- -Offered in all counties (some are shared), range in capacity, size and area served
- -Could include Crime Victim Service Centers and/or DV programs
- -Survivor-centered & trauma-informed, privileged communication, legal victim rights
- -Community specific, communities are the experts of their needs
- -Assist in navigating systems: medical, legal, employment, immigration, housing, educational, correctional systems
- -Assist with Crime Victims Compensation
- -Could include Crime Victim Service Centers and/or DV programs
- -Systems-based advocates: no privileged communication, attached to criminal case
