Juvenile Rehabilitation (JR) serves Washington State's highest-risk youth. Youth may be committed to JR custody by any county juvenile court. The juvenile courts follow prescribed sentencing guidelines to determine which youth will be committed to JR. These youth typically have committed many lower-level offenses or have committed a serious crime. Additionally, Green Hill School (GHS) serves youth who committed offenses under age 18, but received an adult sentence.

## Where is the facility and what is the campus like?

Established in 1889, GHS is a medium/maximum juvenile facility that houses older male youth and young adults. The facility is located within the city limits of Chehalis and is spread over 44 acres with a security fence perimeter.



GHS has three 40-room extended care mental health units, two 16-room residential mental health units with acute care wings and one 26-room intensive treatment unit, academic and vocational school, recreation complex and several other buildings that house support services.

GHS provides for the physical health of youth by providing recreational programming using a gym, weight room, soccer field and softball diamonds.



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## Who lives at Green Hill School?

- GHS supports successful transition into adulthood for youth and young adults by creating pathways for self-sufficiency through meaningful partnerships, employment, new opportunities and effective rehabilitation services.
- The residential treatment model focuses on engaging youth in a supportive, therapeutic relationship and motivating them to replace problem behaviors with pro-social behaviors to meet their needs and pursue their goals.



- Successful reentry after incarceration is based on a strong continuum of care, including evidence-based treatment services; case management; comprehensive education; vocation programs; family inclusion; community-based connections and youth voice.
- GHS has a diverse population which includes youth and young adults that struggle with emotional regulation, long term gang affiliations and serious mental health issues. Youth who cannot successfully program in other residential facilities are transferred to GHS.
- Approximately 80% of GHS youth meet the definition of mental health target population.
- Approximately 42% of youth enrolled in high school have Individual Education Plans (IEPs) and an additional 15% qualify for a 504 plan.
- 85% of GHS youth are violent offenders, 20% are sex offenders, 55% were sentenced in adult court and 74% are youth of color.



## Programs Provided

The program foundation is Dialectical Behavioral Therapy (DBT). The continuum of care includes:

- Intake screening and assessments to determine treatment, medical and education needs
- Cognitive/behavioral-based programs with clearly defined behavioral expectations and positive reinforcers
- Individual treatment and reentry plans addressing specific skill strengths and deficits of each resident
- Intensive outpatient drug and alcohol treatment
- Treatment for youth with a sex offense
- Building strong partnerships with families and youth in preparation for transition back to the community
- Academic school
- Approximately 58% of youth are enrolled in high school
- Associate degree and welding certification through Centralia College
- Approximately 30% of youth are enrolled in college classes
- Youthful Offender Program (YOP) for youth under the age of 25 sentenced to the Department of Corrections through adult court
- Vocational programs in auto repair, auto body, welding, construction and building trades
- Pre-apprenticeship and trades education
- Approximately 50% of GHS youth hold full or part-time jobs on campus
- “MyJob” vocational readiness and work-based learning
- Youth Voice and statewide juvenile justice advocacy
- Financial mentoring
- Personal fitness/nutrition
- Alive and Free
- Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)
- Cultural diversity programs
- Youth family engagement in campus activities
- Tattoo removal
- Transformational mentoring
