

Extended Foster Care (EFC) Housing Options

FOSTER HOME

SUPERVISED INDEPENDENT LIVING (SIL) PLACEMENT

INDEPENDENT YOUTH HOUSING PROGRAM (IYHP)

YOUNG ADULT HOUSING PROGRAM (YAHP)

HOUSING VOUCHER FAMILY UNIFICATION PROGRAM (FUP) VOUCHER OR FOSTERING YOUTH TO INDEPENDENCE (FYI) VOUCHER

WHAT IS IT?

A foster home placement is a placement provided by DCYF. It can include living with a family in the community or a group home.

- Your own apartment or living situation in the community.
- Your SIL placement has to be approved by your social worker or the court.
- You are responsible for rent and other living costs.

- You are on your own lease in the community.
- Monthly rental assistance and other housing costs (i.e. deposits, fees) are provided by the program. Length of rental assistance varies.
- Must participate in case management with IYHP staff.

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- Monthly rental assistance and other housing costs (i.e. deposits, fees) are provided by the program. Length of rental assistance varies.
- Must participate in case management with YAHP staff.

- 36 months of rental assistance provided by the housing authority.
- If enrolled in EFC, must exit EFC within 90 days of signing a lease.

WHO CAN GET IT?

All EFC young adults, 18-21

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- Young adults not in EFC are eligible for this program if they are at risk of homelessness.

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- All EFC young adults, 18-21.
- Must be between 18th and 25th birthday for initial voucher.
- Must have been in foster care between 16th and 18th birthday.
- Must be at risk of homelessness.

HOW DO I GET IT?

Work with your DCYF social worker to ask about staying in your current foster home or finding a new foster home for some or all of the time that you are in EFC.

Work with your DCYF social worker and your Independent Living Program (ILP) case manager to find a suitable location to live. Move in costs may be available to you from DCYF and/or ILP, or through other local community resources.

Contact your local housing authority. FUP vouchers available in 10 counties. FYI vouchers available statewide.

Some housing authorities participate in Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) approved programs that may allow for vouchers to be up to 60 months of rental assistance.

MONTHLY STIPEND?

No. If you are living with a foster family or in a group home, you are not eligible for the monthly stipend. Your foster family or group home receives payment to support your needs.

Yes. The monthly stipend may be used to pay for housing and other living costs.

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Yes, for the first 90 days after signing your lease. At 90 days you will be required to exit EFC and no longer receive a stipend.

If you are in EFC and experiencing homelessness, you may also be eligible for general housing support resources, which vary by county. Call 211, connect with your DCYF social worker, and/or regional Independent Living Program provider for navigation support. Your monthly EFC stipend may be counted as income or may impact your eligibility for other housing programs.
